The Vicars Voice

As I write this, we are about to head into the season of Christ's Passion, Holy Week and Easter. But, no doubt, by the time you get to read this, Easter, for many will over. Done and dusted, and the Easter Eggs will have eaten with relish. It might be that, as with mince pies at Christmas, you might be sick of the sights of Hot Cross buns, though they are available all year round nowadays, (I remember as a child in "ye olde days of yore" they were traditionally only eaten on Good Friday).

There is no co-incidence however, that Easter celebrations occur in the early springtime and that the events of Eastertide take place in a garden. In fact, gardens occupy a central place in scripture. It's interesting that the word garden is mentioned 59 times in the Bible and often used as a metaphor to describe our relationship with God.



The Bible begins with an account of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. It is a scene of harmony and happiness shattered only when Adam and Eve choose not to listen to God and to go their own way. This situation is reversed in another garden, the Garden of Gethsemane. Here Jesus listens to God, and this time God's will is done, even though it proves to be at great cost to Himself.

Then we come to the final scene of salvation revealed in the Easter Garden, with the joyful reality of the resurrection. Any gardener will tell you, that beautiful gardens don't just happen. They take a lot of work, weeding, watering, feeding, planting and

nurturing all the flowers, shrubs and fruit trees, encouraging growth. Gardens can be places which provide a sense of calm, reflection, and a sense of inner peace. So, in the same way we attend to our gardens, we also need to attend to the spiritual side of our lives, holding on to the promise we find in Scripture, "You shall be like a watered garden." (Isaiah 58:11)

As the garden has many seasons, so does the Church, and the Easter season continues until Pentecost, and the coming of the Holy Spirit, following which we celebrate Trinity Sunday, when we give thanks for God in three persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit...but more of that in my next letter!

The Easter Garden was a place of an intimate encounter between Jesus and Mary Magdalene, making himself known in the simple act of calling her by name.

As we continue to give thanks for the Risen Christ, may our hearts be like that garden, a place of intimate encounter, where we listen as God call us by name.

The Eyke Charities'

Eyke Charities' is a registered charity registered with the Charities Commission and was established on 12th March 1881by a committee made up of church members led by The Rev. James George Darling. It's initial object was to provide education/ training, relief of poverty and the promotion of religious activities.

Today this has come down to providing books for the year six leavers of the village school and a token Christmas gift to widows, widowers and those over 80 who qualify.

The charity is funded by six different bequests set up at its inception and currently the interest from them is invested with CCLA Investment Management Ltd and provides an income sufficient to make the payments referred to previously and provide a little more to grow the fund.

Over the years the trustees have endeavoured to make sure that all those eligible are aware of the charity but do know that a number of villagers are either not aware or, if they are have not asked to go on the register of beneficiaries. Of course there is no reason why a potential beneficiary can't apply and then refuse to accept payment so that the fund can grow. A number on the register do this.

If anyone feels that they should be added to the register please let us know. There is only one stipulation and that is that a claimant should have lived in the village for six months before becoming eligible.
